Dangerous to your dog: Cane Toads

Cane toads are very dangerous to your dog. They are everywhere in south and central Florida. If your dog gets one in his mouth he will most certainly die within 15 minutes or so. While it's possible to survive with emergency vet care, there's very little time. I've personally talked to three dog owners who have lost their pets in this manner.

We - my spouse and I - kill several cane toads in our back yard and townhouse property every year. They are an invasive species not native to the US. The Tampa area used to be at the northern edge of their range, but I'm sure that's creeping northward with global warming, and we're certainly seeing an increasing number at our home. This happens yearly during our summer rains.

Cane toads were introduced to the South Florida sugar cane fields to control insects and is one of those great ideas gone wrong. They're dangerous because they exude a toxin that's deadly to other animals. If a dog or cat gets his mouth on one, the dog has about 15 minutes to live suffering a horrible, painful death usually of a heart attack. A bite on the toad isn't necessary, the toxin invades through the mucus membranes in the mouth and eyes.

The size of the toad - another name is "Giant Bufo" - doesn't matter. They are just as poisonous when tadpoles. They are laid as eggs - about 25,000 in one clutch, and I guess fortunately, are cannibals so they feed on each other and only a few survive. But given time and a food supply they can grow quite large - 6 to 9 inches. The ones we have been seeing are about five inches long, but I'm assuming these are fairly young.

The prescribed method of humanely killing them is to put them in a zip-lock bag and freeze them for a couple of days. The State of Florida says that they are to be killed when found. They are easily identified - cannot be mistaken for a friendly frog. They are mottled brownish and are extremely well hidden in soil or vegetation or mulch until they feed just after dark. We have found just a couple in daylight, but usually find them from their motion from a flashlight. They are relatively easy to catch, but if they detect pursuit they'll move faster than you could pursue. We use a frog gig on a 5' pole. We keep a "toad kit" at our back door consisting of the frog gig, gallon ziplock bag and plastic disposable gloves.

The State of Florida website states that if you have what looks like a toad that is 4 inches in length, it's definitely a toad. Their legs are shorter in proportion to their bodies than a frog, and if you're interested, the Wikipedia site has a recording of their sound. They're quite noisy after a rain, and the sound is distinctive.

Cane Toads continued

Our main concern is our Wheaten, Guinness. For many years now we cannot turn him out for his final poop, we have to walk him on a leash in our own back yard, scanning ahead with a flashlight, and it's that walk that we will find a toad, sometimes a close call. We also notice a decline in our lizard population, a sure sign we have a resident toad.

They are capable of limited climbing a tree, maybe a couple of feet to escape but I don't think that's a regular activity. As a part of their natural defense, if you stop pursuing, they'll stop, too. That's to give a predator a chance to put his mouth on the toad, with probable fatal results.

There are pictures available on the internet, just Google "cane toad". There are huge areas of Australia that have been invaded and there are some interesting YouTube videos where people are attempting to deal with them including grinding them up to manufacture fertilizer. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Cane_toad

From March 2004 when we brought Chancey and Daisy's 8 week old puppy home to join McDuffie in our family, at Paradise Island on Lake Wisconsin, this little Wheaten ruled the roost. Her name, Inishkeen, meaning beautiful island became our kennel name. Maille led a busy life, moving to our retirement home in Florida, becoming an AKC Champion and Grand Champion, raising 13 puppies of her own and supervising the raising of her grand puppies and great grands. Her favorite perch on the back cushion of the couch allowed her to watch out the front and back windows at the same time, to sound the alert for all the interesting events in the neighborhood. At age 12 she still had a lively step around the veterans ring, earning BV/VG2 a few times.

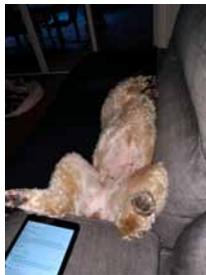
Maille had a severe case of pancreatitis at age 13 that put her in the hospital for several days, and required a permanent change to a low fat prescription diet to keep her healthy. A year later she was diagnosed with bladder cancer that was kept in check with chemotherapy for the remaining 19 months of her life. Her last ultrasound and X-rays showed no spread of the cancer, and her lab work showed nothing unusual a week before she passed. She was a happy and comfortable old girl who had a spot to nap in every room of the house, and still cuddled on the couch when we lifted her up. We watched her slow down as she aged, noticing that at almost 16 she slept more and stiffness from lying still made it difficult to stand up; once up walking though, she moved faster than expected! We miss our sweet Maille, and know she and McDuffie are watching when we see the rainbows in the Florida sky.

RESCUE REPORT

In the year 2019, Rescue adopted out 23 Wheatens, which is considerably fewer than prior years.

During December 2019, 2 year old Lucy was turned over to Rescue. She went to a great couple in Birmingham.

During January, 5 year old Sugar and 7 year old Chief were turned over to Rescue. The owner died and their was no one to take them. Her niece was going to have them put to sleep. Wire Fox Terrier Rescue got wind of this and took them in. They then transferred them to us. We were lucky enough to find a home for them together in Bradenton.



Jake and Jasper from Orlando are five and seven. They were given up because the owner did not have enough time for them. They are currently in a Foster to Adopt home in Sarasota. The couple plans to adopt them both.



At the end of February, Ocean Blue and Island Thyme from Jacksonville were turned over to us. These one year old siblings were given up because of illness in the family. They will be adopted out separately in February.



Seven year old Roxy was placed in a Foster to Adopt home in St. Augustine in December and was adopted officially in January.

Three year old Simba came to us from Boca Raton. Simba was outfitted with a shock collar and rarely exercised. The couple just did not have enough time for her and wanted a better life for her. She was adopted by a wonderful lady in February who will walk and socialize her and take her to training.



2020 is starting off at quite a pace. My colleague Jody Greene in Jacksonville has now taken three pairs of Wheatens. Big thanks to her for arranging the pickup and adoption of these dogs.

IN THE KITCHEN WITH BRANDI

Homemade Dog Doughnuts

Ingredients:

1 Cup Flour
1 Cup Oats
1/3 Cup Coconut Oil
1/2 Cup Peanut Butter
2 Eggs

For Topping:

Plain Greek Yogurt
Bacon Bits

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray a donut pan with cooking spray & set aside. In a large bowl, combine all ingredients (except yogurt & bacon bits). You can mix with a spoon or use your hands. Mix until dough forms.

Use your hands to press dough into the donut pan. Fill each donut cavity & press firmly to ensure everything sticks together (they won't rise, so make sure each space is tightly packed).

Bake for approximately 14-15 minutes or until cooked completely. Allow to cool, then carefully remove donuts from pan.

Now you're ready to decorate them!

Set out a small bowl of Greek Yogurt & another with Bacon Bits. Dip each donut carefully in the yogurt, then sprinkle with Bacon Bits.

Place your finished donuts in the freezer for a few minutes to harden the yogurt. Beau & Brandi like them straight out of the freezer, but you can also store in the refrigerator.

Just keep in mind that the yogurt may get a little sticky if kept in the refrigerator.





Tally Ho! FAST CAT

Imagine this... you the Receiver standing at the end of a fenced in 100 yard course behind the timers. Your dog at the start line with the Releaser holding them back as they eye the Rabbit (plastic bag). And then they are Off "Tally Ho!" says the Huntmaster as your dog runs chasing the lure to arrive in your arms. Yes we all know wheaten's are adorable and cuddly and beautiful..but they are also very smart high energy dogs who need exercise and love working with their owners!

Meet FAST CAT...something your high energy healthy athletic dog can do naturally relying on his instincts. Chase that Bunny! FAST CAT is a relatively new dog sport. Everyone wants to declare their dog as the fastest in their breed. First offered as a titling event by AKC in 2016, FAST CAT has grown rapidly in popularity.

If you want to participate in dog sports but don't want to spend the time or energy with lots of training, this sport is for you because it relies on the dog's natural prey instinct to chase a lure. CAT stands for Coursing Ability Test, a timed 100 yard dash where dogs run one at a time. The dog's time to complete the 100 yard dash is converted into MPH. Dogs earn points based on their handicapped speed. Titles are awarded when a dog has accumulated a given number of points.

Dogs may run without a collar or wear any type of flat collar. Collars should be snug. Clips or rubber bands may be used to keep the Wheaten Fall from impairing vision. When instructed, you bring your dog to the Release area. If you are alone, ask if the club will release your dog for you and then trot down to the other end and become the receiver. After your dog is released (Tally Ho!) you can either quietly watch them chase the lure running towards you, or yell encouragement as you desire. Whatever works better for your dog. Tip: If you are alone, bring an extra leash with you as yours will still be at the start line!

To participate in FAST CAT, your dog should be in excellent health, be at least 12 months of age, and have an AKC number. Before your dog can enter each event, they will get a brief inspection for fitness and lameness, and also to make sure the Bitches are not in season.

To find an event near you, Go to the AKC site and look under FCAT (Performance events) <https://webapps.akc.org/event-search/#/search> At the event you can check and see if they are offering practice runs, which are inexpensive and just for learning. The first couple of times your dog will just be figuring out what is going on and these probably won't be their fastest times.

Please remember to only do FAST CAT if your dog is 100% physically sound and healthy. Also like any other athlete, your dog should regularly be getting exercise including running and conditioning work. Remember to warm up your dog and also cool down just like any other athlete would do. Walking can help with their cool down and also stretches like the Wheaten Greeting and Play Bow. If you are not sure, make an appointment with a veterinarian to get an opinion.

Will your dog like FAST CAT? If they have what is called "prey drive" I would think so. This is a natural instinctive trait in the dog to find, pursue, and capture prey. **Tally Ho!**




