A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

In the fall of 2016 SCWTCGTB began a partnership with The Giving Partner www.thegivingpartner.org sponsored by the Community Foundation of Sarasota County which provides administrative support. Giving enhancement is offered by the Patterson Foundation. Cindy Jacuk and I spent many hours attending trainings and completing the organization's profile making us eligible to participate in The Giving Challenge to raise funds for our 501c3 SCWTCGTB Rescue. We qualify to participate because the services of our rescue are available to the residents of Sarasota, Manatee, Charlotte, and DeSoto Counties, as well as the rest of the state. We are among over 600 non-profits participating.

Then, as donations opened on Tuesday at noon, Cindy's Wheaten Crosley appeared on Facebook seated at the computer wishing she had a credit card so she could get in on the donating. Wonderfully creative ideas Cindy, your efforts paid off. Donations, matches, and the prize Crosley helped us win by getting lots of likes raised over \$3000 for SCWTCGTB Rescue. Thank you to everyone who participated.

As you consider your future giving plans please keep SCWTCGTB and The Giving Challenge in mind. Your gift can go much farther when accompanied by matching funds. We will let you know the date of the 2019 Challenge as soon as we know.

Thank you also to everyone who contributes throughout the year as well. What is the Puppy of Achievement Certificate?

As many of you already know, I am new to Conformation. So it was a surprise to me when my puppy received a Certificate from AKC announcing that Connor was a "Puppy of Achievement". Looking into this further, I found out that Puppy of Achievement (POA) is a new Pilot Program from AKC. Puppies from 4 months to 12 months are eligible to earn this award, and since the program started on Sept 1st 2017, only points accumulated since then will be included. The purpose of this new certificate is to encourage new exhibitors to compete in Conformation.

"We're excited to launch this program as a way to encourage new puppy owners to continue participating in the sport. Our surveys have shown that new exhibitors are encouraged and likely to continue beyond five shows when they achieve some success," said Doug Ljungren, Vice President of Sports and Events. "The Puppy of Achievement certificate program is meant to provide a realistic goal new exhibitors can strive to attain while they and their dog gain experience. We look forward to helping new exhibitors stay engaged and encouraged."

10 points are required to obtain this certificate. There is no special entry requirement and no extra fees involved. Puppy of Achievement points are earned from the 4-6 Month Beginner Puppy competition as well as from the regular Puppy, Puppy 6-9 Month, and Puppy 9-12 Month classes. Points are determined based on the number of puppies competing in a class. No points are awarded beyond the class level at regular shows (Puppy, Puppy 6-9 Month, and Puppy 9-12 Month). At 4-6 Month Beginner Puppy competitions, points are awarded to each puppy awarded Best of Breed/Variety, Best of Opposite Sex, Group 1, and Best in Show. A dog can earn up to 3 POA points at an event.

Point Schedule

In March we were contacted about four month old Ryder - the pup was too much for the owner to handle. The Bentons overnighted him and then Debie took him off to Lisa in Ocala.







What is an Achiever Dog?

The purpose of this new AKC certificate program is to celebrate the dedication of exhibitors and the versatile skills of their dogs.

A dog must earn at least 1 of the 3 sport achievements on or after December 1, 2017. Previously earned titles or participation can be used as 2 of the 3 required achievements.

A dog must earn a placement or qualifying score in three different sports in order to earn the Achiever Dog Certificate.

What is Scent Work?

Dogs have a sense of smell that's between 10,000 and 100,000 times more acute than ours! The sport or Scent Work celebrates the joy of sniffing, and asks a dog to sniff to their heart's content; turning your dog's favorite activity into a rewarding game. It is a terrific sport for all kinds of dogs, and is a wonderful way to build confidence in a shy dog.

In AKC Scent Work, dogs search for cotton swabs saturated with the essential oils of Birch, Anise, Clove, and Cypress. The cotton swabs are hidden out of sight in a pre-determined search area, and the dog has to find them. Teamwork is necessary: when the dog finds the scent, he has to communicate the find to the handler, who calls it out to the judge.


What is CCL surgery?

Dogs have a CCL, the human equal would be the ACL. When a dog tears its CCL, every time the dogs goes to stand or put weight on the leg, the femur slides/rubs on the back of the tibia. This rubbing causes pain and inflammation, which is very uncomfortable. This is why most dogs with a torn CCL will not even put any weight on the leg, or if they do, they will just toe touch the leg to the ground.

There are several choices if surgery is necessary. Rusty is having the TPLO while Breezy had the TTA. Regardless of which surgery you choose the key to long term success is in the after care. It is simply astonishing just how fast these dogs begin to lose muscle mass and range of motion in the knee during this period where they are not weight bearing fully on the affected leg. In the last 20 years, physical therapy principles and techniques have been developed and altered to help dogs recover properly after major orthopedic surgery such as this. Physical therapy for dogs is more commonly referred to as Canine Rehabilitation.


