**Spotlight on Your Wheaten**

We are designing large banners for our booth at Eukanuba's Meet the Breed. The banners will also be used at other Club events for years to come. Last year we borrowed banners, however, since Eukanuba will be here in Florida for the next 4 years, the Board thought we should offer Club members the opportunity to feature their wheatens on the banners. In order to defer the cost of production we have established a price list by photo size. It is a small price to pay to have your wheaten featured on the Club banner. The photos must be of wheatens only, no people or other breeds. Agility equipment, sheep and/or ducks are acceptable if they show a wheaten in a performance event. The photo must have been taken by you or you must have written permission to use the photo. The photographs should be high resolution (150ppi at 24x16). If you don't know what that means don't worry, photographs taken with cameras of 6 megapixels or higher should be fine provided you do not crop the photo. The best way to do this is to fill your frame with your subject. E-mail your full sized uncropped photo to Linda Hallas at [lindah3@verizon.net](mailto:lindah3@verizon.net) with your name, and the size on the banner you would like to purchase. Don't send money until you get confirmation that your photo is accepted. Once accepted and the size determined, you will be sent payment instructions. If your photo isn't high quality enough for the larger spots on the banner, it may be acceptable for a smaller space. We will sell space on a first come first serve basis, provided the photo has the proper resolution. If you want your dog on the banner but don't have a good photo contact Linda ASAP and she will try to set something up to take one for you free of charge.

We want wheatens of all ages, multiple wheatens, a puppy, a senior, or a special dog who has crossed over the rainbow bridge. We hope you will consider being part of this program. The pricing schedule is listed below. Please send your digital photo no later than August 15th.

### MEMBER SURVEY:

In March we sent out a survey to 100 of our members. We were limited to how many surveys we could send so if you did not receive one or did not reply we would still be interested in your input. We can only meet the needs of our membership if we know your expectations. 24% of members responded. Although this number seems low it is above average for this type of survey. We have tried our best to address what we can in the short-term.

**How long have you been a member?** Responses came in with almost equal percentages based on length of membership.

**What are your expectations from the SCWTCGTB?** An overwhelming majority of respondents indicated education, followed by information and rescue. Our Education Day was well attended and we will continue to do more of this type of event. Information is made available on our website and we are sending emails with urgent information (ie. dog food recall). Rescue continues to be a very important part of our Club and information is always in our newsletter and online.

**Are your expectations being met?** Everyone who answered this question indicated "yes". Some of the comments were: "...moving in right direction"; "would like more activities close to...."; "more personal contact with an experienced person"; "supported entry at shows". Our Club members are spread all over the State so it is difficult to have events that are convenient to all. We are going to try out having "neighborhood/regional" events. (See below). Regarding personal contact feel free to contact any member of the Board if you have any questions. Everyone's contact information is in the member directory online. If we don't know the answer to your question we will get it for you. Please contact us any time. Information regarding "supported entry" is in this newsletter.

**Do you participate in our Events?** Over 60% replied yes. Some respondents were new members that didn't yet have an opportunity.

**Reason why not participating.** Distance was the biggest reason, followed by time or timing of event. We need to hold our main events in areas that are easily accessible for most members. Again, we are trying to put together opportunities for our members to get together in their own local wherever possible. Watch your email and the newsletter for upcoming events.

**What other events would you like to see?** Most did not reply to this question. Some comments "liked herding", "more East Coast events", "dog park event - Fort Desoto". We have new events planned for later this year, watch for another herding day, as well as a tracking day, soon to come. If you know of any local events we can support please let a Board member know. We will try our best to support your effort and at the very least get the word out to other members. Watch for information regarding "Wheaten Walks" in your area! Keep in mind we need our members to make any program a success.

**What would you volunteer your time for?** Rescue and events had equal positive responses followed by planning or organizing. This was a blind survey so we don't know who you are - please contact a Board member if you are interested in helping out.

**Other Skills you can offer?** Computer design, Video, Nose work, medical help with senior dogs. See above.

**Do you belong to another club that offers things you hoped your Wheaten club would?** Majority of respondent indicated no.

**If, yes, what would those activities be?** Conformation classes, training, sponsoring shows. Because we have no facility and cover such a wide geographical area it would be very difficult for us to offer classes at this time. We are currently looking at show sponsorship opportunities.

## GENETIC TESTING FOR PLN-ASSOCIATED VARIANT GENES




After years of research supported by hundreds of Wheatens and their owners and breeders, Drs. Littman & Henthorn at Penn Vet have identified mutations associated with PLN in 2 genes. There is now a non-invasive test using a cheek swab which an owner can perform and send by regular mail to the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine. There is no blood testing or complicated mailing. Individual owners can submit samples from their dogs to learn the genetic status and the associated risk for developing PLN or passing it on to their offspring. Breeders and owners have the option to submit these tests anonymously or, for a fee, receive the results for their own dogs. The cost of the kits is being funded jointly by the SCWTCA Endowment and the SCWT Genetic Research Funds and the local clubs are helping by distributing the test kits at their events. If you want the results for your individual dog it is \$125. A reduced fee is available for breeders wishing to test a litter. These kits will be available at our East Coast picnic in October. If you will not be attending the East Coast picnic but would like a kit please contact Kathi Elliot. 
## PELVIC BLADDER IN THE SCWT

### PROBLEM:

2 years ago attention was brought to a problem in young Wheatens identified as a "Pelvic Bladder"

Pelvic Bladder appears to be an anatomic abnormality that results in a shortened and poorly functional urethra. This is NOT the same as an ectopic ureter, which was a point of confusion in the original report. We believe there is a genetic component to this problem, but have been unable to determine this due to lack of a significant sample base.



Urethra: too short, wide, poorly functional

### SYMPTOMS:

The primary symptoms of this condition are dribbling or leakage of urine, evident in early puppyhood. It is diagnosed via Radiographic examination of the urethra and urinary bladder after introduction of contrast medium which may reveal a short, widened, or irregularly shaped urethra.

This condition often responds well to the drug "PROIN"; phenylpropanolamine, which works by tightening the bladder sphincter muscle to help control urine. In several of the cases pelvic bladder has self-resolved as the dog grows and matures...we believe the ureter stretches to normal length.

### BACKGROUND:

When this was brought to light, we contacted an old friend from my "Renal Dysplasia" days:

**Mark W. Neff, PhD, Director, Center for Canine Health & Performance**

**Translational Genomics Research Institute (TGen) & The Van Andel Research Institute (VARI)**

Dr. Neff has worked extensively with Wheaten issues, and happened to be in the midst of a DNA study on the inheritance of Irish coats in the SCWT. He very generously offered to help us out with a preliminary look at Pelvic Bladders. We agreed to assist him obtain DNA samples from both Irish and American coated dogs, and he agreed to add our samples from Pelvic Bladder dogs to his DNA studies.

We hoped the study would answer 2 questions:

- \* Is this condition inherited?
- \* If so, is it through a simple recessive gene?

**"This was NOT a new occurrence"**

Several breeders having experienced this problem volunteered to help. It turned out this was not a new occurrence, there were dogs from years earlier with the same diagnosis. We collected DNA samples for Neff's coat study, plus **6 dogs diagnosed with Pelvic Bladders.**

**These 6 DNA samples were sent to Dr. Neff.** Unfortunately, our sample size was still too small, and we have been unable to find additional dogs diagnosed with Pelvic Bladder.

Shortly after this Dr. Neff received a large grant to investigate cancer in dogs (a hugely important effort), our pelvic bladder study was put aside until we can find a total of 12 affected dogs.

### CURRENT SITUATION:

SCWT breeders are still very interested in following through with this study. But, without additional dogs we will get no information to answer our questions. This is needed to help our beloved breed, and understand the frequency and cause.

We are asking for everyone's help to locate additional dogs/pups with this problem. It doesn't matter where the dog came from and we do not need pedigrees...just a confirmed diagnosis of pelvic bladder.

Sadly, it has come to the point where his people can't even afford to feed him, so he will be coming into Rescue and we need a home for this delightful lad who can manage his allergies.



Six-year-old Fritz in Palm Harbor has Addison's which is a very treatable condition. Fritz loves other dogs and people, knows commands and is just a great dog. We spoke to his vet and he told us he expects Fritz to lead a long, healthy life. His people just can't afford his care any longer. So we need a home (and a new name!) for Fritz.

There is Ollie in Palm Beach Gardens. His "mom" died unexpectedly. She was the caregiver for Ollie and the two standard poodles he lives with. Even at 10, her 91 year old husband just can't handle the Wheaten exuberance and Ollie loves to run in the rain. Nancy Nauman went to meet Ollie and says he is nice boy who is missing his mom and needs some TLC.

We have had a number of successful adoptions in the past three months.

Maize was in a foster to adopt home in The Villages, but it did not work out. Sue Henry and her husband had facilitated the foster to adopt and agreed to foster her themselves when she was returned to rescue. Sure enough, another foster failure! She is just a darling little Wheaten who will live a great life from here on out. She is currently with the Henry's in their summer home in NH. They adore her.

Six-year-old Bella's owner in Pensacola died and she had been passed from home to home. We found her on Craigslist. Doug Marks went to meet her, proclaimed her a great dog, and drove to meet Gail Kania from Pine Apple, AL, who fostered her. ## BREEDER'S CORNER



### SCREEN, SCREEN, SCREEN, YOUR PUPPY PEOPLE...A true story

A couple called a breeder inquiring about a puppy. The breeder spoke to these people periodically for a couple months. They were very nice and they had Wheatens in the past. The breeder googled their names and couldn't find anything about them online - no connections to puppy mills, backyard breeders - nothing at all to raise a red flag. The breeder had a litter a short time later and the people came to her home with their pre-teen son and all were very nice. They played with all the puppies, and the dam and were there for quite a while. After completing the paperwork they were asked for their Driver's License. The wife looks in her purse and says "Oh no, I forgot mine, honey do you have yours?" The husband had forgotten his too. They lived 3 hours away and they were so nice and since they had spoken so often the breeder felt comfortable with them. It was agreed that they



would fax their DL's when they returned home.

They paid cash for the puppy and after all the paperwork was complete the husband scooped up the puppy and was out the door to put him in a crate in the car. The breeder said, "wait, I want to say good bye to him". The husband replied, "no, you don't need to". The wife was hurriedly gathering up their copies of the paperwork on the kitchen table while this is taking place with the husband. They get in the car and drive off leaving the breeder very disconcerted. Their departure all happen so fast that there was nothing for her to do since she was home with only her teenage daughter as her husband was out of town. Their whole demeanor had changed in the last couple minutes and it raised a huge red flag. The breeder looked at their paperwork and noticed that the wife misspelled her first name - who does that? Another red flag. Within minutes of them leaving the breeder starts calling their cell phone over and over and then sends them a multitude of texts - no reply. Finally a reply by text - **"you should have checked us out better"**. She had checked them out - and found nothing about them on public records. It turns out the wife used her middle name and maiden name and the husband used his middle name and the wife's maiden name. The breeder called the local police - nothing could be done - they paid for the dog. The police suggested that she could file a civil suit but it would have to be done in the county where the people resided. The breeder spent the night searching the internet and used the town they wrote down on the paperwork (which it turned out was not close to the big city where they said they were from), in other words too far away to be called a suburb. The breeder then googled "Wheatens" in the town they wrote down and low and behold a website came up - with pictures of children included with some of the wheatens. One of the children was the boy that came to her home. The puppy had just gone to a PUPPY MILL! Even though she only gave limited registration they still had one of her puppies and it was a male.

This breeder made multiple trips every week - 3 hours each way - to meet with Animal Control in their area, and filed a civil case. She met with police and lawyers and did everything possible to get this puppy back. The week prior to the civil hearing they agreed to give the puppy back - in exchange for the payment they made for the dog - less \$65 they agreed to pay for a vet check. Their lawyer met her at a vet office of her choosing in their area and the examination and exchange took place. The decision was already made that no matter the condition she would take the puppy back. There was no way this dog would be bred by a puppy mill owner.

The puppy was very sick. It was full of worms, had Giardia, and was very afraid of people. She took the dog to a vet close to her home and he was quarantined



there for about 10 days. Had the case gone to court, and even had she won they could have appealed and it would have dragged out even longer. The vet believed that the puppy would not have survived 2 weeks longer. These people own a second home away from their residence and it is only for dogs. Carpets have been removed and this is their puppy mill location. Someone comes to feed the dogs twice

a day; other that they are on their own. The breeder went on Google Earth once she had their correct names - they lived in a nice gated community she could see the home they lived in and then she found the puppy mill location. The puppy mill was in a different county on a country road surrounded by wooded lots; the driveway had a chained gate across it.

This breeder vowed she was going to get that puppy back at any cost and fought hard to do so. Luckily it wasn't old enough to collect or breed. She literally spent every day of every week working to get him back and the cost was well over \$1000 to do so (without ending up in court) and she gave back the money they paid for him. The puppy is back with her now and is doing very well. Everyday she took him out to Petco and other public places to socialize him and he is no longer afraid of people. He now has started Obedience classes. He was a potential show dog - he will not be shown now. She is keeping him for another couple months minimum and then will think about placing him in a pet home. Those that are dishonest do not wear signs on their foreheads. These people were very good at their deception and have probably done this before. Some will lie and be deceptive to get their hands on a CH dog or bitch for their line. You cannot check out someone that does not give you their real name and we all have made concessions for people because they were so nice - i.e. not making them drive 6 hours because they forgot their licenses. I have shared this story with a few people that are now asking for a driver's license when selling puppies. Sadly, people aren't always what they seem. The point of this story is BREEDER beware not BUYER beware. These people are getting more devious and creative.

I too have had calls about stud service. I do not even consider breeding unless I have seen the bitch and know (or someone else knows) the owner or they are a member of a Club and can be thoroughly vetted. I personally don't think that there is any such thing as over-reacting in this instance.

### SOME TIPS FOR SCREENING:

- Google and check white pages for names, address, and phone numbers
- Through county appraisers check that the name matches address
- Google earth their homes
- Check locations vs known puppy mills/backyard breeder locations
- Ask for references...call them!
- Ask for a certified bank check
- Check driver's license

**If anything looks suspicious...send them home without a puppy!**
